DC Office of the State Superintendent of Education (OSSE), Adult and Family Education

The OSSE Adult and Family Education unit re-grants federal and local matching funds to eligible local organizations for the provision of adult education (Adult Basic Education (ABE), Adult Secondary (ASE)/General Education Development (GED)/National External Diploma Program (NED) Preparation, English as a Second Language (ESL), English Language/Civics (EL Civics), Family Literacy and Workplace Literacy services integrated with ancillary, workforce and postsecondary transition services to residents of the District of Columbia. Additionally, the OSSE AFE provides state leadership, monitoring, professional development, technical assistance and resources to local adult and family education providers.

As part of its Strategic Plan, the OSSE Adult and Family Education unit conducted a needs assessment to identify areas within the city where the agency could work in collaboration with other organizations to provide literacy, ancillary, workforce and/or postsecondary transition services to youth, adults and families in the District of Columbia. This needs assessment includes 1) the city's priority areas; communities in which DC residents with the greatest needs reside; 2) the locations of OSSE funded Adult and Family Education providers, as well as gaps in services in particular Wards within the city; and 3) potential partners that the OSSE Adult and Family Education unit can collaborate with to address the needs of DC residents.

The OSSE Adult and Family Education unit held a grant competition in May 2010 for Program Year 2010-2011 grant funds. Information from the needs assessment will be considered when selecting eligible applicants to serve and be funded as OSSE AFE sub-grantees for Program Year 2010-2011. The OSSE Adult and Family Education unit will also explore partnering with the organizations listed under Potential Partnerships and other agencies to address the needs of youth, adults, and families residing in the City's Priority Areas.

City Priority Areas

Focused Improvement Areas (FIAs)

City Administrator (CA)

The Focused Improvement Areas (FIAs) were established as a pilot program in November 2007 to combine an increased law enforcement presence with support from human service agencies and community-based organizations to address deeper societal issues facing at-risk communities. There are eight (8) Focused Improvement Areas. FIAs involve several District agencies in cooperation with non-governmental community-based organizations to address the root causes of crime by increasing employment services, engaging youth in meaningful activities, promoting individual health, well being and family strengthening, and improving neighborhood appearance.

In addition to intensified efforts to improve neighborhood appearance, human services resources are focused on at-risk individuals, their families and households. Individuals and households selected for direct outreach and intervention are identified through public safety information and outreach led by non-governmental volunteers including faith-based groups and government agencies and school outreach, with an emphasis on root-cause analysis. The Lead District agencies for FIAs include the Department of Employment Services, Department of Human Services, Department of Parks and Recreation, Department of Health and Department of Consumer and Regulatory Affairs.

New Communities

Deputy Mayor for Planning and Economic Development (DMPED)

The New Communities Initiative is a comprehensive partnership designed to improve the quality of life for families and individuals living in four neighborhoods in the District: Park Morton (Ward 1), Northwest One (Ward 6), Lincoln Heights/Richardson Dwellings (Ward 7), and Barry Farm (Ward 8). The New Communities Initiative provides resources so that the community, in partnership with public and private entities, can work to transform highly concentrated low-income neighborhoods into healthy mixed-income neighborhoods. The Initiative protects housing for the poor with a one-for-one replacement of existing affordable housing, while improving community anchors like schools and recreation centers. Equally important, the New Communities Initiative works with the community to address residents social and economic needs by providing linkages to job training, asset building, health supports, youth development, and other supportive human services.

Neighborhood Investment Fund Areas

Deputy Mayor for Planning and Economic Development (DMPED)

The Neighborhood Investment Fund (NIF) is an annual, non-lapsing fund to finance economic development and neighborhood revitalization in 12 targeted areas of the District. The fund is capitalized by an annual contribution of 15 percent of the personal property tax, not to exceed \$10 million. The NIF Target Area Project Grants (TAPG) fund initiatives that will revitalize twelve (12) targeted areas in the District of Columbia: Parkview/Columbia Heights (Ward 1), Logan Circle (Ward 2), Shaw (Ward 2), Brightwood/Upper Georgia Avenue (Ward 4), Brookland/Edgewood (Ward 5), Bloomingdale/Eckington (Ward 5), H Street (Ward 6), Deanwood Heights (Ward 7), Anacostia (Ward 8), Bellevue (Ward 8), Congress Heights (Ward 8), and Washington Highlands (Ward 8) by strengthening economic development opportunities and improving the quality of life of residents in these areas. The project focuses on vocational job training and job placement for youths and adults, trade development, senior and youth programming, affordable housing preservation, and small business technical assistance.

Public Housing Communities

DC Housing Authority (DCHA)

The District of Columbia Housing Authority (DCHA) is an independent public agency that provides affordable housing for low-income families, seniors and people living with disabilities in the nation's capital. The DCHA works closely with residents, landlords, and the federal and DC governments to improve the quality of life in the District through better housing and diverse neighborhoods.

Through its public housing program, DCHA owns and operates 8,000 units of rental housing spread over 63 public housing communities. It administers the Housing Choice Voucher Program (formerly Section 8), working in cooperation with more than 3,000 landlords in DC. DCHA, through the federal government's HOPE VI competitive grant program, has developed vital mixed income communities where the city's most distressed public housing projects once stood. DCHA also revitalizes older properties through innovative partnerships with other DC public agencies, nonprofit organizations and real estate developers.

In addition to providing quality housing, DCHA actively helps its residents grow both personally and professionally through a variety of economic development and self-sufficiency programs. DCHA works cooperatively with social service providers to facilitate resident access to other supportive services.

Potential Partnerships

DC Department of Employment Services (DOES)

One Stop Career Centers

The DC Department of Employment Services (DOES) plans, delivers and administers employment related services to DC residents. DOES has two full service One Stop Centers - the Franklin One Stop Career Center (Ward 5) and Naylor One Stop Career Center (Ward 7). DOES helps develop the District's workforce through training and education. DOES funds a variety of training providers located throughout the metropolitan area to serve DC residents.

Career and Technical Education Programs (CTE)

In partnership with the Office of the Deputy Mayor for Education, the DC Department of Employment Services (DOES) ensures that DC residents 18 years of age and older can learn skills and earn certifications necessary to excel in high growth industries. DOES' Career and Technical Education (CTE) programs provide free job training and skill development to District residents so that they can attain workforce certifications. DOES funded CTE classes are offered by the Community College of the District of Columbia in the evenings at three (3) DC Public Schools (DCPS): Cardoza Technical High School (Ward 1) – Construction Academy CTE Program; Roosevelt Technical High School (Ward 4) – Hospitality CTE Program; and Phelps Architecture, Construction and Engineering High School (Ward 5) – Pre-Apprentice Carpentry Program.

DC Department of Human Services (DHS)

The DC Department of Human Services (DHS) coordinates and provides a range of services that collectively create the enabling conditions for economic and socially challenged residents of the District of Columbia to enhance their quality of life and achieve greater degrees of self-sufficiency. The DHS Income Maintenance Administration (IMA) determines the eligibility of applicants for federal and District funded assistance programs, recertifies the eligibility of recipients for federal and District-funded assistance programs, and helps heads of households receiving TANF benefits to become employed and move toward financial independence. IMA determines eligibility for benefits under the [Temporary Cash Assistance for Needy Families \(TANF\)](#), [Medical Assistance](#), [Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program \(SNAP\) \(formerly Food Stamps\)](#), and [Child Care Subsidy](#), [Burial Assistance](#), [Emergency Rental Assistance](#), and [Interim Disability Assistance](#), [Refugee Cash Assistance](#) and programs. In addition, IMA's Food

Stamp Employment and Training Program (FSET) provide employment and training services to able-bodied adults without dependents who receive food stamps. DHS IMA Service Centers include: the Taylor Street IMA Service Center (Ward 4), H Street IMA Service Center (Ward 6), and Anacostia IMA Service Center (Ward 8).

DC Department of Parks and Recreation (DPR)

The DC Department of Parks and Recreation (DPR) provide quality urban recreation and leisure services for residents and visitors to the District of Columbia. DPR supervises and maintains area parks, community facilities, swimming pools and spray parks, and neighborhood recreation centers, as well as coordinates a wide variety of recreation programs including sports leagues, youth development, therapeutic recreation, aquatic programming, outdoor adventure, camping, and senior citizen activities. Adaptive programs and facilities are available for persons with disabilities.

DC Housing Authority (DCHA)

The DC Housing Authority (DCHA) has two (2) Resident Opportunities for Self Sufficiency (ROSS) Centers: the Family Enhancement Center at Lincoln Heights (Ward 7) and Park Morton Neighborhood Network Center (Ward 1). These centers offer job training workshops, job placement assistance, home ownership counseling, after school programs, literacy classes, fatherhood workshops, computer training classes and work preparation training. Additionally, DCHA operates a third center - the Southwest Family Enhancement Center located in Greenleaf Gardens (Ward 6) - in partnership with the DC Department of Employment Services (DOES). The center provides job training, basic computer skills training, GED Prep and job placement assistance for public housing residents from Greenleaf, James Creek and Syphax Gardens and Ward VI residents referred by DOES. A DOES grant allows DCHA to also run a Transitional Employment Program (TEP) at the center. TEP is a subsidized (for-pay) job training program designed for people who have been either unemployed or underemployed for a period of time, and need to improve basic skills to enhance their chances of landing a job. DCHA, in collaboration with two non-profit organizations, the American Kidney Fund and A Wider Circle, also provides health services and activities to seniors from James Apartments at the New Beginnings Senior Wellness Center (Ward 2). The facility, located at Judiciary House, includes an exam room, an exercise center, a computer center and a kitchen area for cooking classes and monthly wellness brunches.

DC Public Libraries (DCPL)

The District of Columbia Public Library (DCPL) has 25 branch libraries that serve residents with an array of services that include books, periodicals, and media. DCPL has the following services and resources for use by residents of the District of Columbia: e-Bic Business Center, WiFi, computer classes, databases and software, an Adult Literacy Resource Center, adaptive services, Income Tax Assistance, and meeting rooms.

DC Public School (DCPS) S.T.A.Y. High Schools

For the past two years, the OSSE has worked diligently to establish a partnership with three (3) DCPS Alternative High Schools: Ballou S.T.A.Y. High School, Roosevelt S.T.A.Y. High School and Spingarn S.T.A.Y. High School. The DCPS S.T.A.Y. High Schools serve students age 16+ who have not succeeded in traditional high school settings, in-school students enrolled in other high schools across the city who need to take additional classes in order to graduate on time, and older students returning to school. Ballou S.T.A.Y. offers a variety of academic and vocational components that meet the needs of students including cosmetology and barbering courses. Roosevelt S.T.A.Y. offers ELL Program, GED Preparation and Career Pathway Programs in culinary arts, computer repair and hospitality. Spingarn S.T.A.Y. provides high school coursework and vocational classes. Additionally, all three schools offer youth and adults an opportunity to acquire a high school diploma through the National External Diploma Program (NEDP).

Family Strengthening Collaboratives

A Family Strengthening Collaborative is a consortium of social service organizations that provide comprehensive services and support to children, youth and families. Each collaborative offers an array of services that may include: crisis intervention, cultural arts, day care, after-school care, substance abuse counseling, mental health services, parent education, employment and training services, and housing assistance. The collaboratives located in the District of Columbia include: The Columbia Heights/Shaw Family Collaborative (Ward 1), Georgia Avenue/Rock Creek East Family Support Collaborative (Ward 4), Edgewood/Brookland Family Support Collaborative (Ward 5), North Capitol Collaborative – Weed and Seed Program (Ward 5), North Capitol Healthy Family/Thriving Communities Collaborative (Ward 6), East of the River Family Strengthening Collaborative (Ward 7), Far Southeast Family Strengthening Collaborative (Ward 8), South Washington/West River Family Strengthening Collaborative (Ward 8).








OSSE Adult and Family Education and DC Public Library (DCPL)






OSSE Adult and Family Education and DC Parks and Recreation (DPR)




